Election of metro township elected officials and city council members.

*The chair from each of the metro townships and one member of the city council will sit on the Municipal Services District Board.

January 2017

The city and metro townships are officially incorporated and the new elected officials are sworn into office.

Municipal Services District

What is the Municipal Services District?

The Municipal Services District (MSD) manages the revenue and the budget paying for delivery of municipal services for the metro townships and unincorporated areas of Salt Lake County, as well as for cities within the county that join or contract with the MSD for municipal services.

Municipal services are services often managed by cities, such as road maintenance and street lights, storm drains, and snow removal. See a complete list of the municipal services Salt Lake County currently provides.

How is the Municipal Services District (MSD) managed?

The MSD will be managed by a Board of Trustees composed of locally elected council members.

Prior to November 2016, (when elections are held for city and metro township council members) the Salt Lake County

Council will act as the MSD Board of Trustees.

In January 2017, when city and metro township council chairs take office, the MSD Board will consist of each metro township council chair, city council member, two county council representatives and the county mayor as the district executive.

MSD Board of Trustees members will have weighted votes based on their community's population.

How will municipal services be paid for?

Sales tax revenue from the unincorporated areas of the county, as well as sales tax revenue from metro townships and cities that join or contract with the MSD to provide services will make up the budget.

(Since 1977, the county has paid for municipal services through a separate municipal services fund. The new Municipal Services District will operate in similar fashion.)

- Salt Lake County, UT— This week, Salt Lake County Clerk Sherrie Swensen swore in the ninemember County Council as the new Board of Trustees for the Municipal Services District. Trustee Jenny Wilson was chosen as the board chair and Trustee Richard Snelgrove was selected as the vice-chair.
- The new Municipal Services District (MSD) was created by Senate Bill 199 and was implemented by the council as the budgeting entity for future municipal service delivery for townships and unincorporated areas. Examples of municipal services include snow-plowing, animal services, street-lighting and sidewalks, among others. Residents are this month voting on whether to become a metro township or a city. Residents of the unincorporated islands are also voting on whether to remain unincorporated or annex in to an adjacent city.

• In November 2016, residents in the metro townships or cities will elect local council members or local council members and a mayor. One of the newlyelected officials will have a seat on the MSD Board beginning on Jan. 1, 2017. Two County Council members will also sit on the MSD Board. Until that time, the County Council functions as the Board of Trustees.

• Work is underway to write agreements that will allow the MSD to contract with Salt Lake County to provide the services. The effective operational date of the MSD is January 1, 2016.

• Residents of the townships and unincorporated islands will see no change or disruption in their municipal services during the transition.

2016 April 21st ShakeOut

Friends and Neighbors –

You may have heard of the <u>Great Utah ShakeOut</u> that will occur on April 21st - a State-wide simulation earthquake of 7.0 at 10:15 AM. We encourage each home to participate in the ShakeOut which is intended to "shake us out" of our comfort zone and prepare for the real thing. You can register for the **Great Utah ShakeOut** at <u>www.shakeout.org/utah</u>. This site also provides additional suggestions for participation.

Here is our challenge to each of you. Before April

<u>21st</u> – put your emergency plans in order. Make a plan.

- Who can be your out of state contact if family members are separated in a disaster? Confirm that contact;
- 72 hour kit inventoried and updated (batteries, food, water, contact information, etc.) store near exit point;
- Earthquake proof your home to the best of your ability (cabinet doors/furniture/hot water heater secured, etc.);
- Gas tank filled;
- New batteries in smoke alarms;
- Evacuation & follow-up plan posted where everyone knows where it is and understands it;
- Have you prepared for your pets?

<u>April 21 at 10:15 AM</u> – The media (radio/TV) may make an announcement. However, wherever you are in your home at 10:15 AM (set an alarm clock to go off that everyone can hear) – when the alarm goes off, "drop, cover and hold on" for the duration of the "quake" – perhaps a full minute. Then proceed through your earthquake procedures: is everyone all right; assess damage; no gas or water ruptures? Test your emergency contact number. Can you shelter in place or do you need to evacuate? Can you drive or do you need to walk out? Grab your 72 hour kits, children and pets –

Once your own home and family are secure, those of you who are CERT trained could put on your vest and knock on the doors of your immediate neighbors. Announce that you are participating in the <u>Great Utah ShakeOut</u> <u>Exercise</u> and that as part of that exercise you are simply checking on the well being of your neighbors.

Watch the media for announcements of other activities that might be available for your participation or observation. If you are unable to participate in the **April**

21st ShakeOut – please select another date for your own exercise.
